What is Title I?

Title I is a federally funded program designed to provide services to meet the educational needs of students who are at risk of not meeting the National Common Core Standards in English Language Arts and Mathematics. All Title I services are supplemental to regular classroom instruction and school curriculum.

- Targeted Assistance Program Title 1 funds are targeted to support specific needs and programming
- Early Learning Program
- Summer Jump Start for incoming kindergarteners
- Summer Tutoring Program for K-5 students
